This movie is part of the project SEX ROBOTS - Future and Taboo for Women* - An Educational Video as a Medium for Informal Learning in Adult Education (01.05.2022 - 31.09.2023) and is co-funded by the European Union through Erasmus+ Small-scale Partnerships.



Our project is conceptualized for Adult Education and focuses on raising awareness about the influence of Artificial Intelligence (AI) in humanoid sex robots on female and non-binary people and their sexuality. The story behind

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During her journey, Tiffany gathers insights from experts from various fields, such as katta who raises questions about the societal and political significance of sex, and Kate who explores the possibility of sex robots enriching human intimacy. Johannes delves into the differences between sex robots and other intimacy aids and examines the future of sex and technology. Iris raises ethical concerns related to the development of sex robots, including potential privacy violations, while Janina discusses the construction of AI for sex robots and the potential therapeutic applications of the technology. Tanja proposes "new networks of desire" and addresses conflicts within feminist perspectives on sex robots.



The documentary aims to stimulate reflection and discussion about the impact of technology on human sexuality and relationships, while questioning the ethical implications of developing humanoid sex robots. Through Tiffany's journey, viewers are invited to engage with questions about the role of sex in society, the objectification of women and non-binary people, and the potential for technology to promote or hinder human emancipation.







Kate Devlin

Dr. Kate Devlin is Reader in Artificial Intelligence & Society in the Department of Digital Humanities, King's College London. With an undergraduate degree in archaeology and an MSc and PhD in computer science, her research investigates how people interact with and react to technologies, both past and future. Kate is the author of the critically acclaimed Turned On: Science, Sex and Robots (Bloomsbury, 2018), which examines the ethical and social implications of technology and intimacy. Kate is currently Advocacy and Engagement director for the UK's Trusted Autonomous Systems Hub - a collaborative platform to enable the development of socially beneficial robotics and Al systems that are both trustworthy in principle and trusted in practice. She is a board member of the Open Rights Group, a UK-based organisation that works to preserve digital rights and freedoms, and is a campaigner for gender equality to improve opportunities for women in tech.



Johannes Grenzfurthner

Johannes Grenzfurthner is an award-winning artist, filmmaker, author, and performer. He is the founder and artistic director of monochrom, an internationally acting art and theory group and film-production company. Boing Boing referred to him as a leitnerd, a wordplay that ironically hints at his role in nerd/hacker/art culture. His last films were the feature-length horror films "Masking Threshold" (2021) and "Razzennest" (2022). He will soon release the documentary "Hacking at Leaves". Johannes is a lecturer on transmedia arts at the University of Applied Arts, Vienna, Austria, and communication theory at Leuphana University, Lueneburg, Germany. He is head of Arse Elektronika, a sex and tech festival in San Francisco, and organizer of Roboexotica, the Festival for Cocktail-Robotics in Vienna.

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Tanja Kubes

Dr. Tanja Kubes is a sociologist at the FU Berlin. As an expert on socio-technical topics, she worked as a researcher and lecturer at TU Munich, TU Berlin, TU Graz and LMU Munich. Her research ranges from queer posthuman robots to feminist AI. She was a member of the Standardisation Roadmap on Artificial Intelligence and collaborated on UNESCO's Artificial Intelligence for more Gender Equality and against Discrimination policy action plan. She is a reviewer for numerous international journals and scientific organizations and spokesperson for DIG*IT*AL, which critically examines digitization processes.



Janina Loh

Prof. Dr. Janina Loh née Sombetzki is an ethicist (Stabsstelle Ethik) at Stiftung Liebenau and honorary professor for Ethics of Technology and its Social Contexts (Ethik der Technik und ihrer sozialen Kontexte) at Hochschule Bonn-Rhein-Sieg, University of Applied Studies, Centre for Ethics and Responsibility (ZEV). Their main research interests lie in the field of responsibility research, trans- and posthumanism (esp. critical posthumanism), robot ethics, Hannah Arendt, feminist philosophy of technology, sustainability (esp. in the context of Loh's concept of a critical posthumanist ethics and with regard to artificial intelligence, digitalization, and robotics), polyamory, and ethics in the sciences.





Iris Phan

Iris Phan is a lawyer in the IT Law Department at Leibniz Universität Hannover, Germany. She also teaches robot ethics at the Institute of Philosophy and conducts research on the ethical and legal implications of artificial intelligence. Her focus is on data protection law, IT security and the impact of artificial intelligence on society. The working title of Iris´ doctoral thesis is: Legal and ethical implications of artificial intelligence using the example of the sex robot.



Jason Scott is a digital archivist and historian, and founder of TEXTFILES.COM. Based in New York, USA, Jason works to protect and preserve at-risk digital creations on and off the Internet. In the 1980s he was busted at his middle school for selling ASCII pornography at 50 cents a printout.





katta spiel I hold a career position on 'Critical Access in Embodied Computing' at the Vienna University of Technology, Austria and I am working in the field of Human Computer Interaction. I research marginalised perspectives on embodied computing through a lens of Critical Access drawing on queer and crip theories. My work informs design and engineering supporting the development of technologies that account for the diverse realities they operate in. In my interdisciplinary collaborations with neurodivergent, Deaf and/or nonbinary peers, I conduct explorations of novel potentials for designs, methodologies and innovative technological artefacts.


Patryk Senwicki, Producer
